City to turn into fortress

■5K policemen to guard route; special teams of SRPF, QRT, BDDS to be present

The city will see heavy police security Sunday for the Standard Chartered Mumbai Marathon with 5,000 policemen guarding the entire route and the venue. Special teams have also been formed to tackle contingencies. keeping in mind the possibility of terror attacks. Besides, plainclothes policemen will be conclandestine ducting checks at sensitive locations.

According to Mumbai police spokesperson DCP Dhananjay Kulkarni, the event and the route will fall into the jurisdiction of five zones, namely zone 1, zone 2, zone 3 and zone 5 which comprises Reserve Police Force Kulkarni. areas from south Mumbai to areas bordering western suburbs such as Mahim, Sion and Dharavi. "Thus there Disposal Squad (BDDS) would be five zonal DCPs commanding 3,000 service. policemen and officers from the police stations respond in case of a ter-in these areas.
