Palishkar's mother, equally proud of his victory, said, "He is not only interested in sports, but also music. He plays the harmonium and tabla and even composes songs and wants to pursue theatre."

The events are held every year to showcase talent and to engage those with epilepsy in various activities. A workshop for consultants was also held to educate them on myths about the disorder and to inform them on latest treatments.

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## Doctors, epilepsy patients to take part

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MUMBAI: Around 200 people
— including doctors and
patients—from the Epilepsy
Foundation will run for full
and half marathons at the
12th edition of Mumbai
Marathon on Sunday.

Dr Nirmal Surya, founding trustee of Epilepsy Foundation, said, "This is our fifth year at the Mumbai Marathon. We want to spread awareness about the fact that people suffering from epilepsy can be cured with proper medication. They often go through severe depression. We have set up cheer zones for them during the marathon, in which few artists will entertain and encourage them to complete the event."

Eight doctors and 12 patients of Epilepsy will

run for full marathon, while 28 participants are running the half marathon, of which 15 runners are from Indore.

Surya said: "It is important that epilepsy patients participate in main events such as full and half marathon instead of dream run. Through this, they will develop a feeling that they are no different from others and they can achieve what others can do."
